Vicholas Nixon: Recent Work Nirough October 30

Nicholas Nixon first photographed densely filled views of Boston in the mid 1970s. He has returned to photographing the city and found newer, more interesting problems than those in the photographs of 25 years ago. With a long lens, the space of the city is compacted and scale is distorted. The new images are so perfectly composed, every element fits like a puzzle piece into a complex, deeply moving whole.

William Eggleston, Los Alamos
Through January 4,2005

Known for his pione<mark>ering work in color photogra-</mark> phy, which he helped establish as a serious artistic medium, William Eggleston uses a color-intense, dye-transfer printing process and works within the seemingly artless snapsh<mark>ot style to photographed</mark> everyday life, adhering to a philosophy of the "democratic camera" that <mark>ignores representa-</mark> tional hierarchies. The images in the Los Alamos series were taken between 19<mark>65 and 1974 during</mark> Eggleston's travels in the Ame<mark>xican South and</mark> West. The 88 prints in the exhibition include the first image in this body, taken in his hometown of Memphis, as well as pictures of the Mississippi Delta, New Orleans, Las Vegas, an<mark>d Los Angeles.</mark> When Eggleston's photographs were first exhibited in 1976, they provoked a critical resp<mark>onse that</mark> ranged from admiration to outright condemnation. His medium, subject matter, and compositional style broke from established conventions of what constituted fine art photography, and his project—although visually compelling—was hard to summarize.

San Francisco Museum of Modern Art 151 Third Street, San Francisco (415) 357-4000 www.sfmoma.org Stéphane Couturier: Building Sites Through October 16 Stéphane Couturier photographs building sites all over the world that, except for the vegetation or lack of it, could be anywhere in the world. His vision is not about the specificity of place as much as an investigation of the relationship between the different focal points of the picture. The anonymity of some of the partially built structures and the homogeneity of architecture in others offer few points of distinction or aesthetic interest. Rather, the structures, construction sites, and backgrounds become geometric details in the larger scene that is more visually coherent as a whole entity. Only when considered in this way do the details come alive, giving the photographs a sense of almost geometric beauty and balance.

David Parker: Sirens Through October 30

These sublime seascapes landscapes reveal solitary pinnacles of rock that rise above still seas and appear as sentinels at a mysterious borderline. The photographs unveil a delicate balance between earth and void, suggest a deep sense of space, and place the viewer before a world that appears close yet unreachable and infinite. Parker's toned gelatin silver prints draw on the work of 19th century topographic photographers such as Carleton Watkins and Timothy O'Sullivan, featuring rich tonalities, cloudless skies that create negative space, and a similar approach of understated objectivity. Parker exercises expanded control of time and space in his photographs. Using modern non-digital techniques, Parker willfully removes the clouds and omits entire landforms, shaping the images to reflect his vision. The photographs in Sirens reference the early masters of the medium while offering a more phenomenological response to land and sea.



She was also generous in sharing her considerable knowledge of natural history and love of the outdoors.

I first got to know Rachel in 1979 when we were paired as roommates on a Photochrome trip to Yosemite. We became fast friends and shared many wonderful trips together.

She excelled in all aspects of photography, but was especially renown for her outstanding bird photography and her mastery of extreme macro photography. Her photograph of an aphid giving birth to live young is indelibly etched in my memory.

It is seldom that we are directly able to impact the life of someone else, but when I think of all I learned from her and where it has taken me, I realize how much she influenced my life and miss her all the more.
