In our effort to keep Photochrome going strong we're pursuing new membership, increased awareness to the creative vision of our members through local shows and looking for creative ways to fund raise.


What can you do to help keep Photochrome going strong?

# Where is Your Favorite Place For Photography?

Our members are a peripatetic bunch and when they were asked recently to name some of their favorite places for photography, the answers were varied. ## **Chris Kibre** was the first to respond, and tells us:

My favorite places to photograph that are close to home are at the local botanical gardens:

- ♦ San Francisco Botanical Garden at Strybing Arboretum in Golden Gate Park,
- ♦ Botanical Garden in Tilden Park in the Berkeley Hills.
- ♦ U.C. Botanical Garden in Strawberry Canyon above the campus in Berkeley.

The Tilden Park and Strybing gardens are free; the UC Botanical Garden is free if you are a member of Strybing, otherwise there is an entrance & parking fee.

All three have lovely California Wildflower sections and interesting cactus & succulent sections so there is always something of interest to photograph at any time of year. Golden Gate Park also has a duck pond and one may sometimes see Great Blue Herons or California Quail in the gardens.

The botanical gardens also have the added benefit of labels with common and scientific names for your nature titles.

#### Janet Stock checks in with this gem:

One of my very favorite places in early spring is Steep Ravine on Mt Tamalpais. Especially wet, flower filled years like this one! But then, where isn't it lovely in spring in years like this one?

#### **Jim Service** is a fan of:

Mt. Diablo in the spring. Eastern Sierras in the fall.



**Joyce Vanman,** while saying she doesn't really have any "favorite" places, goes on to say she looks for beauty wherever she can find it.

I like the Mission a lot. Of course it is where I live. I love Ocean Beach. There are always lots of photos there. I don't go out specifically to shoot as often as I would like, so end up taking the camera with me when I go places with friends. I do like Sutter Buttes a lot and all the orchards on the way. Oh! And Sacramento Wildlife Refuge and the whole string of refuges up there. Pescadero Marsh is a favorite place, although I haven't been there in a while. I was a docent there a few years back.

Alice Steele. Well, I promised at the meeting when I asked the Favorite Places question, to tell you of at least one of mine. It's very specific: There are good, sometimes easy, shorebird shots in Princeton-by-the-Sea. Several kinds of gulls, other shorebirds, and occasionally brown pelicans, frolic and feed here. Find Prospect Avenue (it won't be hard) and at Broadway, go left a few feet to the end of the road. There's a low cliff, with a beach below. Not at high tide, and not at low tide, but in between, *nearly always* the birds use this as a playground. Besides, if you time it right, and the tides cooperate, you can stop for a nice lunch at Barbara's Fish Trap, too. It's just up the road.

# California Stories Uncovered: Photographs by Immigrant and Refugee Teens

Through May 31

Immigrant and refugee teens reveal their unique view of California in this photography exhibit, the result of workshops and one-on-one mentoring relationships with renowned documentary photographer Rick Rocamora. These teens from five different ethnic backgrounds tell the story of what it means to be an immigrant or refugee in California. Shaded is an 18-year old Mission High School senior from Mumbai, India, who recently acquired his pilot's license and plans to pursue a career in aeronautical engineering. Jan is a 13-year-old eighth-grader from Burlingame whose family comes from the Philippines. She is an honor student and sings soprano in a choir. Ghita is an 18-year-old Muslim originally from Morocco. She spent several years in a foster home before moving out on her own recently. Armel is a 14-year-old high school freshman from Albany who was born in the Congo. He plays the Congolese drums and performs with his father in schools and other venues. Yarov is a Russian-born 13-year-old eighth-grader who lives with his family in the Tenderloin. He loves to play computer games and do volunteer work.

# **Robert Bechtle: A Retrospective**

Through June 5

Including a painter in a photography gallery listing may seem strange but there is much that is photographic about this artist's work, even while it takes advantage of what paint has to offer. Working in a sun-bleached color palette and photorealist style, painter Robert Bechtle gives us a quiet Americana: streetscapes, family scenes, portraits of cars. Working from photographs of familiar subjects (family and home, for example), he creates a record of a precise moment while withholding just enough detail to remain painterly. The result is an uncanny reflection of middle-class American culture. Many viewers will recognize the light and architecture of the Bay Area in Bechtle's images. Indeed, this San Francisco-based artist has taken his various neighborhoods as a primary subject. This exhibition traces his career from his early photo-based pieces of the 1960s to his most recent work, with 91 paintings and works on paper.
