FotoClave Competition
Coming Soon

What do Delta, San Joaquin Valley, Central Coast Counties, and N4C have in common? They are all Councils, composed of camera clubs. And once a year, these Councils all get together and hold a conference and competition.

This year it's in Sacramento on October 28, 29, 30. There will be lots going on and you'll hear more about that next month.

Right now it's time to discuss competition.

Preliminary competitions are held by each Council. Prints and slides may be entered into competition in Pictorial, Nature, Travel and Photo-Journalism. (Not Creative, that enters under Pictorial) Your images need not have placed in Club competitions to be eligible. There is no limit to the number of entries you may submit for this preliminary judging; however, no more than two images in any one category by any entrant can go on to the final judging at FotoClave.

Needless to say, if your entry is selected to continue on to FotoClave, it is already an honor as the competition among N4C Clubs is fierce.

Your slides and prints should be ready to go to N4C in August (specific date to be announced) for the preliminary judging. Entries should be marked as usual, with the addition of "N4C" on the back next to "Photochrome". Be aware in your selections for Foto-Clave, that it is unlikely that you would get FotoClave images back in time for our own Club judging in November.

## Favorite Places



These Snowy Egret chicks are at the Palo Alto Baylands Nature Preserve right now. One way to get there: Take 101 to the Embarcadero turnoff in Palo Alto, go East on Embarcadero to the T intersection, and turn left to the Duck Pond. The palm trees to the East of the pond are home to the nesting egrets. Early in the morning is best. When I was there 8am on June 11. I was surrounded by guys with monster lenses from Santa Clara way. But a 200mm lens would likely capture these beauties. They are that close.

On your way back you might pay a visit to the kite sailors off 3rd Avenue in San Mateo. Afternoon or early evening winds seem to be just about right these days. The kite surfing activity is

## MORE Resources

## Slides from Digital Images By Deborah Hall

Having made the switch from film to digital almost a year ago, I am often asked how I have slides made for competition. While some of my entries this year have been from slides shot in past years, the majority are now digital images converted to film. The quick and easy way to do this (and the way I started) is to take a picture of your monitor. This requires a clean screen, a dark room and a tripod so you can shoot at a slow enough speed to avoid flicker. However, you will get higher quality results by sending your digital files to a service bureau. All of the local options are expensive, but there are many web-based alternatives. I haven't tried any of them, but other club members have been satisfied with the results.

Instead, following in Gene Morita's footsteps, I send my images on a CD to Lloyd Bever in Merced. Lloyd has been a member of and a judge for photo clubs for many years. He is also incredibly friendly and helpful. He purchased the equipment necessary to produce slides from digital files and has been offering his services at the reduced rate of \$2 per slide (plus tax and shipping) to photo club members. A few of us have been joining together and sending a batch of 36 images to him every month or two (faster turnaround, lower shipping costs if we use a whole roll of film). He tells us that the protocol for uploading files is a bit unusual, but the price of \$1.39 may be a good incentive to give it a try.

## Matting your Prints

Probably most of us have made the pilgrimage to Cheap Pete's, for print mats.

Well, Jim Silva tells of two other places for good quality matting materials.

A local outlet that does matting, mounting and framing reasonably and well is called Great Plans Framing & Gallery, at 3028 Taraval Street. Jim says, "Ask for Gary."

But Jim also tells us of another place for wholesale mats and mounting boards, either standard size or cut to specifications. It's called Redimat with a website:

Www.redimat.com

They sell wholesale with a minimum order of \$50, but the prices for mats, boards and supplies are attractive. They also sell poly bags. The website is addictive with lots of useful information easily available (check out "resources"). Their offices are in Novato but they do not have a showroom there. You order by telephone: 1-877-883-1011, or by email.

Marilyn Minter: New Works Through July 24

This series features work by New York-based painter Marilyn Minter in her first solo museum show. Minter's work examines the relationships between the body, photography, and painting, tapping into cultural anxieties about sexuality and desire. This exhibition focuses on her recent works, hyperrealistic close-ups of makeupladen lips, eyes, and toes, whose luscious colors, glossy surfaces, and immediate subject matter are both seductive and disturbing. While Minter's images mimic fashion advertising with alarming veracity, her exaggerated gestures subvert it, exposing the pleasures and dangers of glamour.

## John Gutmann at 100 July 7 through August 20

Born in Germany in 1905 and trained as a painter, John Gutmann took up photography in 1933 and supported himself as a photojournalist after immigrating to the US. Having settled in San Francisco, he helped link the West Coast to European modernism, inspiring later generations of photographers through his unique capacity to disclose the ambiguities and oddities within the commonplace. With a European's cultural background and an eye trained in the German avant-garde, Gutmann observed aspects of American culture that eluded most American artists of his time.


## Eadweard Muybridge: San Francisco in Panorama

Through October 8

Eadweard Muybridge (1830– 1904) was one of photography's first technical and artistic wizards. This exhibition from the California Historical Society collections samples these amazing works, including groundbreaking experimentations that presaged the invention of motion pictures and his monumental 1877 panorama of San Francisco, presented in a first-ever, "walk-in" enlarged roundabout view donated by modern-day digital magicians from Pictopia in Berkeley.

very close to the shore and even a 200mm lens should capture some good action. From 101, take the 3rd Ave exit, head East to the Golf Driving Range, go left on Lakeside Drive and park at the end of the road.

Other spots nearby to check out are Sierra Point near Candlestick, and Coyote Point, which I'm told have good photographic opportunities.

To check for wind/weather conditions at any of these places, a good site is *IKiteSurf.com* or their sister site *IWind-Surf.com*. You have to register but you get good charts on wind and tide conditions.
